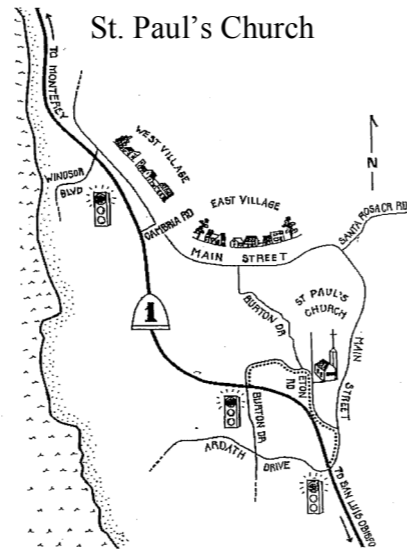

## Pulpit Exchange June 26, 2011

On Sunday, June 26th, St. Paul's will host The Reverend C. Barry Turner, Rector at St. Stephen's -SLO since 1996, in a pulpit exchange.

Prior to moving to the Central Coast, Father Barry served for 11 years as Rector at St. Paul's in Oroville. He has also served as an assistant and interim at Episcopal Churches in Oregon.

Barry grew up in San Diego and graduated from UCSD in 1970 with a B.A. in Philosophy and a minor in the History of Science. He studied Philosophy of Religion at Trinity Divinity School in Deerfield, Illinois and then studied at Fuller Theological Seminary, from which he received a Master of Divinity in 1979. He was confirmed in the Episcopal Church that same year.

As a seminarian, Father Barry served churches in Southern California and Petaluma. He was ordained both Deacon and Priest at St. Mary's Episcopal Church-Napa, in 1980 and 1981.

Barry has been married to his wife, Ruth Whitney, since 1980. They have two children: Matt (22) and Elizabeth (19). In his spare time, Barry enjoys family backpacking trips and astronomy.

## A Note From the Music Director



As I sit and reflect on my first year at St Paul's I can't help but feel entirely grateful for the experience of sharing music with you all. I had so much fun sharing my favorite music and hymns and studying about yours. Fulfilling requests has been a very enjoyable part of my job here as it connects me to the musical passions of others, and helps mine to grow. Music is certainly growing in my life and St Paul's has been the corner stone to that. When Father Fred asked me to research the history of church music for the Instructed Eucharist I was overwhelmed at the task before me, and in doing so I gathered enough information for *ten* Instructed Eucharists!

While reading about the Bach family as part of that research, and also from studying Bach under the tutelage of my wonderful piano teacher, Rudolph Budginas, I have come to appreciate the genius of this composer and his vast contribution to sacred music. Without Bach's polyphonic writing of cantatas and organ music, half of the hymns would be missing from our hymnals! A child prodigy who famously walked 30 miles barefoot in hopes of out-playing the great organist Reincken in Hamburg, Bach took up positions at various royal courts where he was able to hone his craft. Revered for their intellectual depth, technical command and artistic beauty, Bach's works include, but are not limited to, the *Brandenburg Concertos*, the *Goldberg Variations*, the *Partitas*, the *Mass in B minor*, the *St Matthew Passion* and *St John Passion*, the *Musical Offering*, more than 200 surviving cantatas, and a significant number of equally notable organ works.

Bach's abilities as an organist were highly respected throughout Europe during his lifetime, although he was not widely recognized as a great

## Dear Friends at St. Paul's,



Bill and I will still be worshipping here with you as fellow travelers on this sacred journey of learning more and more about how to truly follow Christ. I will miss being the Deacon here,

but I am grateful for the opportunity to have served these final years in my own congregation.

## Day of Discovery Planned



The Diocese of El Camino Real's Commission on Ministry (COM) invites members of all parishes to a "Day of Discovery" on Saturday, June 18 at St. Paul's, Salinas. This one-day retreat, from 10 a.m. to 3 p.m., helps individuals explore and respond to their particular calls to ministry. Developed by the Rev. Sam McClain and Linda Curtoys of Stephenville, Texas, the program leads participants in a process of discernment: *"Discernment Ministry is a lifelong process of attending, perceiving, listening, and discovering how best to express Christ's ministry through the Church."*

The Day of Discovery offers the opportunity for those already engaged in active ministry to renew their call, or to explore new ways to respond to God's call. Although this Day of Discovery is a required first step for anyone discerning a call to ordained ministry, it is in no way limited to such individuals. The event also offers an opportunity to explore and celebrate the ministry of all the baptized, and look at ministry development in the four orders: laity, deacons, priests, and bishops. Previous participants in the "Day of Discovery" have described the process of discernment as rejuvenating, validating, and transformative.

Following the Day of Discovery retreat, participants take on a self-guided twelve week exploration to enhance their appreciation of how the four orders of ministry complement each other in fulfilling the mission of the Church, and discern where they fit into that mission.

## Outreach Update

Seven checks went out to local organizations this month.

The Outreach Fund Committee wanted to address the issues of Recovery and Support for Families affected by Substance Abuse. The Cambria Connection and the North County Connection in Atascadero each received \$200.

Poverty, hunger, and homelessness in our area is another important concern. Loaves and Fishes in Paso Robles and Atascadero each received \$200. El Camino Real Homeless Organization (ECHO), which gives food and shelter (31 beds) at night, seven nights a week, plus guidance for job hunting and life skills for men and women and mothers with babies received \$300. A large bag of toothpaste and tooth brushes collected by the congregation was delivered there as well.

The needs of children is another concern. The Singing Hands Choir in Paso Robles, which teaches children Sign Language while encouraging children with socialization and hearing and communication challenges, received \$200 towards their Scholarship Fund to pay the monthly fee for children to participate in the program whose families are in financial difficulty.

Alzheimer Caregiver Support Relief : \$200 was given to the SLO Alzheimer's Caregiver Respite and Relief Fund to provide care for persons suffering with Alzheimer's Syndrome, and even financial help for a primary caregiver, usually a spouse or adult child, so he or she can have a weekend

## ***Bea Balint Honored As Parish Woman of the Year***

Bea Balint was recently named St. Paul's Honored Parish Woman of the Year, a nomination coordinated by Father Fred and ECW President Georgia Spelts and submitted to ECW Diocesan President Wanda Bryan. At age 96, Bea continues to lead an active, Christ-centered life of service. She is the primary office aid for our Parish Office and each week spends several hours folding and stapling our bulletins and other Sunday documents. During busy seasons, like the weeks preceding Holy Week, her time volunteering mushrooms and it is common during the busy weeks for her to spend up to 5 hours at a stretch volunteering in the office. What work can't be completed on site, she takes home and assembles in the wee hours of the morning while the rest of her neighborhood sleeps (2 am usually!) She still bakes cookies for Sunday Coffee Hours and each month joins the rest of St. Paul's food volunteers to staff a 6 am food distribution program for the needy.

A gentle, loving and loyal friend, she used her talents as a retired beautician as recently as last spring, to help her gravely ill friend, Bertha Forrest, feel a little fresher during the last stages of Bertha's life, by giving her bedside haircuts. Her special gift to a dying friend really touched the hearts of Bertha's family at a difficult time.

The Honored Parish Woman of the Year criteria is simple: "A female member in good

standing of the parish who serves with a grateful and joyful heart", and Bea certainly fits the bill! Always smiling, Bea expresses her gratitude to the Lord often for still being able to serve her church.

## **Betty Pierce Honored**

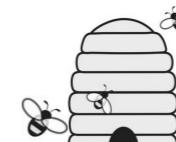

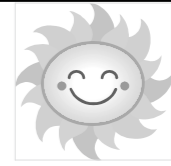
### **Bench Assemblers Needed!**
